The bug bit and didn't let go, and within a year he was doing bluewater (open ocean) passages, cruising, and keelboat racing. A firm believer in sailing on "OPB" (other people's boats), Alejandro does not own or plan to own a boat (yet), as his happy place is crewing on races and chartering in remote locations. Since moving to the US, has been actively participating in the Berkeley Yacht Club beercans and J/105 Fleet. The boat is kind of a project that he enjoys working on, casually day sails, and even races some. He eventually hopes to retire and sail as long and as far as he can, perhaps even to Greece or a Coconut Milk Run across the Pacific. He's a singlehander for now, but remains ever hopeful of finding a cruising/racing partner.

Nick G's first race was onboard his new boss's Express 37 during a Wednesday night Richmond YC beercan race immediately after graduating in 1996.
